Dear Minister.

I am submitting the initiatives outlined below for my portfolio for consideration as part of the Budget 2019 process.

Vote Health represents a significant proportion of the annual Government Budget package. It contributes directly to the wellbeing of all New Zealanders, and helps New Zealanders live longer, healthier and more independent lives. A strong and sustainable health system is a key contributor to a more equitable society, as good health contributes to better education and employment outcomes, greater participation in communities, and sense of belonging in society.

The Vote Health portfolio budget package is firmly focused on delivering the Government's priority outcome: Support healthier, safer and more connected communities, as well as making a strong contribution towards two additional priority outcomes: Make New Zealand the best place in the world to be a child, and ensure everyone who is able is earning, learning, caring and volunteering.

Accordingly the bids support ensuring the Health portfolio delivers on its role to achieve these, specifically through initiatives supporting:

- our response to the mental health and addictions review and Mental Wellbeing strategy
- contributing to address the workforce, infrastructure and service delivery issues we have identified in the health system
- contributing to the Child Wellbeing strategy; and
- improving equity through access to affordable, quality health care.

Furthermore, as outlined in the Budget Policy Statement five priorities were identified as part of addressing the challenges in the Wellbeing Outlook in Budget 2019. Vote Health's contribution and focus through this suite of budget initiatives specifically contributes to:

- Supporting mental wellbeing for all New Zealanders, with a specific focus on under 24 vear-olds
- Reducing child poverty and improving child wellbeing, including addressing family violence; and
- Lifting Mâori and Pacific Incomes, skills and opportunities, with Health's contribution focusing specifically on pathways to ongoing employment for Mâori and Pacific, increased investment in Mâori and Pacific Health Innovation funds, initiatives to get to Smokefree 2025 and reducing the incidence and the improving the management of rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease amongst Mâori and Pacific.

The proposed initiatives for Vote Health also respond to significant external drivers. The population is expected to increase by a further 75,000 New Zealanders over the coming year. The number of people aged over 65 will increase by 27,475, which leads to pressure for additional services. Economic factors, such as CPI and LCI, increase pressure on costs, but the largest is remuneration pressure from the DHB employed workforce.

While investment is required to respond to these pressures and rebuild New Zealand's health system after a period of neglect, Vote Health is also at a critical stage of reform. He Ara Oranga, the report of the Inquiry into Mental Health and Addiction, provides the foundation for transformation of mental health services. Vote Health is supporting critical cross-Government work to improve child wellbeing and address family violence. In addition, a number of initiatives are designed to improve access to primary health care – the front door of the health system – in order to lift health outcomes and improve equity.

These external pressures and progress toward system change, combine to a large package of budget proposals for Vote Health. I look forward to considering them against priorities in

# Mâori health workforce development package - Pathways to ongoing employment to enable equitable health outcomes

A programme of new initiatives and expanding current programmes across the training and development pipeline targeting future Māori health professionals to incentivise, support and provide wrap-around services, from students/low paid workers into paid health employment. Initiatives cover the whole training and development pipeline so shortages don't occur.

# Increasing Te Ao Auahatanga Hauora Māori: Māori Health Innovation Fund


Te Ao Auahatanga Hauora Māori: Māori Health Innovation Fund (the Innovation Fund) supports Māori health providers to design, develop, deliver, evaluate and spread innovative health services that work towards achieving pae ora (healthy futures for Māori).

This Budget initiative will increase the value of the Innovation Fund to support more Māori health providers, at a greater level, to trial and evaluate innovative models of health care. Increasing the Innovation Fund will also enable the spread and scaling of more Māori health innovations with evidence of effectiveness.

This initiative aligns with the following three Government priorities:

- Reducing child poverty and improving child wellbeing, including addressing family violence
- Supporting mental wellbeing for all New Zealanders, with a special focus on under 24s
- Lifting Mâori and Pacific incomes, skills and opportunities.

Reducing the incidence and the improving the management of rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease amongst Māori and Pacific

This funding will be used for rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease prevention and management in the Auckland region (Auckland, Waitemata, and Counties Manukau DHBs), and includes a set of initiatives to:

- Develop, implement and evaluate community-led and whanau-driven innovative strategies in the Auckland region for Māori, Tongan and Samoan ethnic groups to improve access to primary care for sore throat management
- Pilot screening for rheumatic heart disease for Māori and Pacific pregnant women at their 18-week scan
- Pilot access to free dental care for people on secondary prophylaxis for rheumatic fever and lifelong free dental care for those with rheumatic heart disease.

It will also be used to:

- Implement a national patient management system / register to manage the delivery of secondary prophylaxis as well as linking the key health providers that are involved in the care of rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease patients
- Implement the key recommendations from the process evaluation on the delivery of the Healthy Homes Initiatives (HHI)

# Wraparound support programme for Pacific students to successfully complete a nursing/midwifery undergraduate degree

This initiative seeks funding to provide a wraparound support programme for Pacific students embarking on a health career, to support them through the completion of the nursing/midwifery undergraduate degree. It will provide financial support to pacific students during the course of study, cultural and clinical support and advice (mentorship/pastoral care), a learning environment that endorses and supports Māori and Pacific values and beliefs, and increased support networks and liaison services.

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## Intensive parenting support

This bid seeks to expand Pregnancy and Parenting Services (PPS) to three new sites. PPS is an intensive outreach service that provides case co-ordination and services for pregnant women and parents with children under 3 years of age who are experiencing problems with alcohol and other drugs and are poorly connected to health and social services. It aims to reduce harm and improve wellbeing of children by addressing the needs of parents whilst working to strengthen the family environment.

This initiative aligns with the Government priority areas of "Reducing child poverty and improving child wellbeing, including addressing family violence". It also contributes to Child Wellbeing Budget priority: Investment in preventative and early interventions to support

children in early years (0-6) and their parents, families and whānau [Cab 18 Min 0449.01 refers].

# Family Violence Services (cross agency bid process Lead Agency Ministry of Justice)

As part of the Joint Venture on Family Violence and Sexual Violence the Ministry has been participating in a cross-agency Budget process. The agreed package focuses on prevention and the national roll-out of integrated community responses to family violence and sexual violence. The split of funding between participating agencies has not yet been finalised. Through this process the Ministry has sought funding for the Violence Intervention Programme which builds the capability of front line health professionals to screen for family violence and sexual violence and intervene to support victims. The Ministry has also sought funding to support DHB participation in the integrated community responses, to set up Child Protection Teams in DHBs and explore the expansion of the Child Protection Alert System to primary care.

# Improving wellbeing in schools and early childhood settings through quality physical activity and nutrition

Schools and early learning services will be supported to create healthy food environments through guidelines, curriculum resources, and nutrition health promoters including supporting the adoption and implementation of healthy food, and water-only (and plain milk) policies and the enhanced delivery of the Health and Physical Education curriculum. A physical activity workforce will support approximately 85% of primary schools to deliver active school environments by enhancing teacher practice, confidence and support for school leadership generally and in relation to the curriculum.

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# Primary Health Care Cost and Volume Pressures

This funding is essential to retaining reduced patient co-payments for high need populations to address inequitable primary care access. It funds increased cost pressures and service volumes due to growth in the number of people enrolled in PHOs for the following initiatives:

- · Care Plus
- · Very Low Cost Access ( VLCA) practices
- · zero fees visits for children under 14
- · Community Service Card (CSC) holders reduced co-payments
- · System Level Measures

The funding addresses the constrained ability of primary health care organisations to raise revenue by increasing prices, and will support practices to meet the expected downstream costs of the DHB Nurses MECA settlement for primary care employed nurses, as signalled in the settlement. Funding cost and volume pressures is essential to continuing to improve access to primary care by maintaining reduced patient co-payments for high need populations.



## District Health Boards - Additional Support


Disability Support Services (DSS) - Support Service Funding





# To fund the impact of expected minimum wage increases

# National Bowel Screening Programme Implementation Year 3

This funding for the National Bowel Screening Programme (NBSP) will enable a further DHBs to implement the NBSP and fund the associated costs relating to the five DHBs in the National Coordination Centre, laboratory testing, diagnostic and surveillance colonoscopies and bowel screening regional centres.

Bowel screening will reduce bowel cancer mortality, increase the proportion of bowel cancers detected at an early stage, reduce treatment costs, and increase five year relative survival rates for bowel cancer.
