




# Te Pou Hauora Tūmatanui | The Public Health Agency

Pou Whirinaki | Strategic Intent and High-level Operating Model design




### Whakataukī

### Mā te mahi tahi o ngā whenu, mā te mahi tahi o ngā kairaranga, ka oti tēnei kākahu

By weaving together the threads and by the collective efforts of the weavers, this cloak will be completed

To be successful, the Public Health Agency (PHA) needs to weave together multiple relationships, strategies and plans. The uniqueness and strength of each are not lost in the weaving, but form part of the overall cloak. There is no one single weaver, but a large team across many groups and agencies, who need to co-operate and work together.

This whakataukī is slightly modified from the whakatauākī of Kukupa Tirikatene. This senior Ngāi Tahu kaumātua referenced a whāriki, a mat, rather than a kākahu, a cloak. We have used the image of the cloak because we have been inspired by the imagery of *Whakamaua* and want to connect our Pou Whirinaki with the aspirations of that plan and *He Korowai Oranga*.







### **Purpose**

This document provides key guidance required to establish the PHA within the future Ministry of Health. Literally meaning *pillar of support, Pou Whirinaki* acknowledges this document as a supporting foundation for the establishment of the PHA.

Pou Whirinaki is divided into the following sections:


#### Strategic Intent

Pou Whirinaki links the PHA's strategic intent and operating model design to the intent of the health and disability system reform and vision for the health system in Aotearoa, that meaningfully achieves pae ora/healthy futures for all.








# Strategic Intent of the Public Health Agency



#### Pae Ora Healthy futures for all

People, their whānau and communities are enabled and supported in achieving their health and wellbeing aspirations, and equitable health outcomes.





### Purpose of the Public Health Agency

The PHA will be established as a distinct, branded business unit within the Ministry of Health to provide system leadership for public health and advise the Director-General and the Minister of Health and Associates on public health matters.

#### Te Tiriti o Waitangi

The PHA will align with the Ministry of Health who is the kaitiaki ensuring the Health and Disability sector fulfils the special relationship between Māori and the Crown under te Tiriti o Waitangi.

#### **Prioritise Equity**

The PHA will prioritise equity within all programmes and activities for Māori, Pacific peoples, disabled peoples, and other population groups that continue to experience inequitable health outcomes.

#### **Lead Key Functions**

The PHA will lead all public health and population health strategy, policy, regulatory, intelligence, surveillance, knowledge and monitoring functions. The PHA will also specify public health promotion, prevention and protection programmes to be commissioned and delivered by the MHA and Health NZ.

### **Public Health Leadership**

The PHA will embrace and enable leadership on public health matters from across the sector and communities. The Director of Public Health will be based in the PHA and will also provide direct leadership to the NPHS.

### **Cross-Sectorial Collaboration**

The PHA will advocate for population health approaches across government agencies and sectors outside of health that have a direct influence over determinants of health and facilitate collaborative and joined-up action.

### Public Health Advisory Committee

The PHA will support the new expert advisory committee on public health, established as a Ministerial Advisory Committee to provide independent advice to the Minister of Health, the PHA and Health N7.

## Strategic & Policy Framework

The PHA will establish a public health strategy and policy framework which will influence future National Health Plans.

### Better Connect Science & Health

The PHA will strengthen links between science, public health and policy particularly in relation to surveillance and the role of laboratories through an effective, fit-for-purpose and sustainable Public Health Knowledge and Surveillance System.






### The PHA in the Reformed Public Health System

#### **TE AKA WHAI ORA- Māori Heath Authority**

- Lead for Hauora Māori in the system
- Lead commissioner of Kaupapa M\u00e4ori health services and co-commissioner for wider services
- Partner with Manatū Hauora and Te Whatu Ora to design, plan and deliver culturally responsive public health strategies, policies, programmes and services
- Ensures whānau voice is central to policy, strategy, planning and service design, development and delivering
- Responsible for public health strategy insofar as it relates to Hauora Māori
- Commissions and co-commissions some public health services
- Sign-off / co-develop the Te Pae Tata (NZ Health Plan)
- Sign-off / co-developing national public health strategy
- Does not deliver services



#### TE POU HAUORA TŪMATANUI - Public Health Agency (Manatū Hauora - Ministry of Health)

- · Kaitiaki of public health, through the PHA
- Lead all public health and population health strategy, policy, regulatory intelligence, surveillance and monitoring functions. Including cross-sector collaboration to address determinants of health in conjunction with Te Aka Whai Ora
- Develops national public health strategies and priorities with Te Aka Whai Ora
- Leads strategic national planning with Te Aka Whai Ora identifies data drivers, equity focussed priorities, contributes to Te Pae Tata
- Does not directly commission services, however sets the priorities that guide the planning and commissioning cycle
- Does not directly deliver services but will specify public health programmes to be commissioned and delivered by Te Whatu Ora
- Support the Public Health Advisory Committee, established to provide independent advice to the Minister of Health, the PHA and Te Whatu Ora.

#### TE WHATU ORA- Health NZ & NATIONAL PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE

- · Responsible for public health operational policy
- Lead public health and population health operations in partnership with the Te Aka Whai Ora
- Commission and co-commission public health services
- Deliver public health services (e.g. health protection)
- Holds core delivery functions of Te Hiringa Hauora (Health Promotion Agency) as a shared services function with Te Aka Whai Ora.
- Lead on Te Pae Tata (NZ Health Plan) in partnership with Te Aka Whai Ora
- Responsible for some public health service delivery through the NPHS





## Te Tiriti o Waitangi

The PHA will support the Ministry in its responsibility as kaitiaki in ensuring the Health and Disability sector fulfils the special relationship between Māori and the Crown under te Tiriti o Waitangi.

Applying the Articles and Principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi

Meeting our responsibilities by being an authentic Tiriti partner is necessary if we are to realise the overall aim of Pae Ora under *He Korowai Oranga* and accelerate equity for Māori to achieve equitable outcomes for the system as a whole. Meeting our obligations under the articles of te Tiriti underpins Whakamaua and responds to the findings of Wai 2575

### **Equity**

For the PHA, equity is focused on enabling equity in public health and population health outcomes, particularly for Māori, Pacific peoples, disabled peoples, and other population groups that continue to experience inequitable health outcomes.

Equity in health outcomes, particularly for Māori, Pacific peoples and low socioeconomic groups is a ministry-wide priority. The PHA will focus on building on the Ministry's own capability to address health equity for those most affected by inequities in the socioeconomic determinants of health.

### The Ministry defines health equity as:

Differences in health that are not only avoidable but unfair and unjust. Equity recognizes different people with different levels of advantage require different approaches and resources to get equitable health outcomes. Health equity is an enabler of wellbeing and is a critical component in rebalancing approaches and resources to meet different needs. (Ministry of Health 2019c, page21)

#### The PHA will:

- Embed a pro-equity, population approach across public health and the wider health and disability system at all levels (national/regional/local) and all functions, particularly through Health NZ
- Accelerate equity for those with enduring intergenerational inequities, including Māori and Pacific Peoples
- Recognise the connection between Article III of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and Māori aspirations for equitable outcomes
- Promote the cultural shift needed to affect the system change that achieves equity in health outcomes
- Make equity real through collaboration with the broader health system and communities
- Focus on where the burden of disease lies and the underlying causes, and be a catalyst for the aspirations, strengths and needs of populations experiencing health inequity to improve their health outcomes
- > Facilitate equity focus across the PHA operational landscape.




