workforce.

Context

- 1. The New Zealand Speech-language Therapists Association (NZSTA) is the largest professional community of speech-language therapists in Aotearoa New Zealand, with more than 1150 members and student subscribers.
- 2. Speech-language therapy does not fall under the Health Practitioners Competence Assurance Act. The profession is self-regulated by the NZSTA. which oversees the registration of over 1,000 registered speech-language therapists.
- 3. NZSTA members are from a broad range of speech-language therapy practice areas that work across the lifespan and across multiple sectors such as health, justice, and education.
- 4. The NZSTA is committed to excellence in speech-language and swallowing care, enabling people with communication and swallowing difficulties to participate in their communities.
- 5. The NZSTA sets ethical and professional standards of practice for its members, advocating on communication and swallowing health care matters, and providing accountability, professional development, practice resources and guidelines.
