Thank you for your request for information under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act) to the Ministry of Health (the Ministry) on 30 June 2019 for:

"In 2014 funding for the Diabetes Care Improvement Package was transferred to District Health Boards.


Please advise the funding transferred to each District Health Board in 2014 relating to the Diabetes Care Improvement Package."

In 2012, Diabetes Care Improvement Packages (DCIP) were introduced across all district health boards (DHBs) in order to allow for a more flexible approach to diabetes care. These packages were expanded in Budget 2013 with an investment of \$12.4 million over four years. Funding for these packages was devolved to the DHBs in 2017.

A table is attached as Appendix One which outlines the funding provided to each DHB for DCIPs in the 2016/17 financial year, and the services provided with this funding.
